The Piqua Promise Grows

The Piqua Education Foundation (PEF) has "doubled" its efforts by providing 10 members of the PHS Class of 2017 with monetary assistance to launch their post-secondary education beginning this Fall.

PEF Board Member Dr.

Jim Burkhardt, along with
Superintendent Dwayne
Thompson and PEF Board
Member Soha Shah, form the
nucleus of a unique program
known as The Piqua Promise
enabling graduating seniors to
each receive \$2,500 scholarships
to pursue their future careers.
This amount is matched by
Edison State Community College
which provides students with an

additional \$2,500 to cover a full year of tuition. Last year marked the unveiling of the Piqua Promise scholarship program where five PHS graduates were awarded scholarships.

This year's scholarship recipients include Kayli Anderson, Rayna Brownlee, Morgan Hazeltine, Claire Hilleary, Derek Jennings, Dante Kemp, Kelly McClelland, Brooke McName, Jennifer Teilez and Darby Wright.

In addition to the Piqua Promise recipients, Dr. Burkhardt announced 149 scholarships worth an estimated \$263,000 were distributed during Class Night thanks to the generosity of numerous donors.
PEF, he noted, has been granting scholarships to
PHS graduates for over 30 years. He anticipates growth will continue as donors demonstrate their willingness to participate. Teacher Elly Snapp launched a campaign this school year among her peers

who contributed toward the scholarship fund.

"At the opening day for the Piqua staff I, as a member of PEF, challenged the PCS staff to raise enough money to sponsor a Piqua Promise scholarship. A teacher at each building was drafted to collect donations and, by mid-September, \$2,500 was raised." Ninety-two staff members districtwide participated. At Class Night, it was announced Rayna Brownlee was the recipient of the staff-sponsored scholarship.

Dr. Doreen Larson, president at Edison, commented "Community colleges were established to provide access for students to gain a college education.

The Piqua Promise scholarship removes any financial barrier students graduating from Piqua High School experience in attending Edison State."

"For many students and their families," she continued, "the Piqua Promise is the key that opens the door to college. We are grateful to the PEF for setting aside specific funds for students to attend Edison State and we. in turn, are able to match those funds to fully cover the cost of tuition and fees for students obtaining these scholarships. We are equally excited to have the number of PEF Piqua Promise students double from last year and we look forward to continuing to grow this most successful investment in our most 'promising' students."
