Magoteaux graduated from Piqua High School in 2000. Sarah Jane Zechman, back then, was a member of student government, sang in the Show Choir, and played tennis under Coach Deb Retman for the Indians. "I went to a Leadership Workshop sponsored by the Ohio Energy

Project," she said. "I talked with Mike Nygren who helped me put my life goals in focus."

She knew she wanted to help people and make a difference. "I thought about a career in law or politics," she said. "But Mike suggested I look at those I most admired, and I realized that would be my teachers. He also thought Mount Vernon Nazarene would be a good college for me." After high school, Magoteaux entered the Middle Childhood Education program at Mount Vernon. She concentrated on math and social studies and earned her bachelor's degree in 2004. Currently, she is working on a master's degree from Miami University.

"I chose Mount Vernon because it was a small, very friendly campus," she said. "In a strange coincidence, when I told my mother that someone suggested Mount Vernon, she said that one of her friends had just mentioned Mount Vernon. It was meant to be." While Mt. Vernon was the perfect fit for Sarah Jane, she did spent her fall weekends watching University of Dayton football since her fiance Kyle played linebacker for the Flyers.

Other engaging projects include math songs and math raps are shared by the 6th graders to teach math concepts to the 5th graders. "My students really get into this," Magoteaux






said. "It's a big deal for the sixth-graders to go back down to fifth grade and help those kids."

Harry Potter serves as a backdrop for assignments and rewards. "My classes are divided up into different houses just like Hogwarts," Magoteaux said. "The houses can gain or lose points, and the winning house at the end of each quarter has a celebration." An interesting spinoff of this activity is how many students have started reading the Harry Potter series. "I think it is very special that students are reading Harry Potter books because of math class," she said.

At home, the ever active Magoteaux enjoys swimming, golfing, walking on the bike paths, and Zumba classes. She and her husband Kyle, an engineer for Hartzell Propeller, have been married seven years. "We were high school sweethearts since 9/9/99," she said. They have a son and a daughter. Libby Jane is three years old, and Si is seven months.
