REACH Helps Parents to Help Their Kids to Read

Engaging parents as learning partners is the ultimate goal of a literacy program being piloted by Piqua City Schools in tandem with the Milton-Union Exempted Village and Franklin-Monroe school districts. A total of \$2.1 million was awarded the districts as part of a Straight A grant made possible by the Ohio Department of Education.

Technology Director Erich
Heidenreich and Superintendent
Rick Hanes have provided the
leadership on the operational
side of the program (technology,
equipment, security, and training)
while Springcreek Principal
Teresa Anderson, Tina Watts
(Favorite Hill) and Sara Atkinson
(Springcreek) are producing the
learning modules.

The 36 learning modules (bytes) will enable kindergartners and first graders to grasp reading concepts and will reinforce those concepts at home with touch screen laptop computers. The program, better known as Reading Expands All Children's Horizons (REACH), enables both parents and students to interactively work together at home.

"Modules are reinforced with glossaries and a clear expectation of terms taught in the classroom," notes Watts. Resources have been readily available from PBS/Think TV to make learning fun. The "bytes" are developed based upon state standards and focus on five fundamental components. For example, to enhance the rhyming of words, one module "Mrs. McNosh Hangs Up Her Wash" focuses on word rhymes, clap/count syllables, and word families such as "at", "cat", "bat" and "sat" complemented by video clips.

Team members anticipate the innovative REACH project will "revolutionize" classroom teaching and provide early learners with a boost on their educational journey. Children will be provided access beyond the school day through the 1:1 learning, interactive content. Useful parental tips and available resources are included with each module. "Computer production," admits Anderson, "has provided us with a whole different world and language."

Both the Crane Center at The

Ohio State University and Wright State University serve as partners in this exciting venture.

Countdown to Kindergarten!

Although kindergarten classes for the 2015-2016 school year don't get under way until August 26, parents and their children are already getting a "solid idea of what kindergarten looks like" according to Nicklin Principal Loretta Henderson.

"Countdown to Kindergarten!" represents a totally revamped six-step registration process which began in February. The rigors of the curriculum have also been scrutinized to ensure students have a strong set of reading skills, the ability to write and express themselves, problem solve and develop lifetime social skills.

A kindergarten kickoff was

held in March at both Springcreek and Washington primary schools. As parents and children entered the commons area hand-in-hand, faculty and administration warmly greeted them with skits and other activities.

Superintendent Rick Hanes welcomed this fall's kindergarten class by reminding everyone what Piqua City Schools have to offer: 1) identical facilities in newly-constructed primary schools; 2) all day, every day kindergarten for all students; 3) Chromebook laptops for students to take home as the result of a "Straight A" grant; and 4) caring, wonderful staff.

"We hope you get an idea of what kindergarten is like," suggested Henderson, who along with staff, rotated kindergartners and their parents from room to room. "We can't wait to find out the unique qualities of your child."

Throughout April, scheduled screenings will take place as parents/guardians continue to discover unique opportunities provided by the school district, submit outstanding paperwork and communicate needed information to staff. An open house on August 20 will enable families to meet their child's teacher and classroom and participate in a special scavenger hunt.

Building Construction Reaches the Final Stretch

Staff, students and parents at both Springcreek and Washington are working well together familiarizing themselves with the new facilities, according to Business Coordinator Curt South, who reports "no glitches" since the move was completed prior to Christmas break.

"Due to redistricting, only the populations of the old Springcreek and High Street schools were moved," explains South. "The populations of Nicklin School and Favorite Hill School will move over the summer with both buildings to be fully occupied in August."

Washington School is "100 percent complete" while Springcreek's site work continues throughout summer months. South noted, "This includes finishing the demolition of the old building, constructing the student drop off and staff parking lot, and widening State Route 36."

December 2020; however, we had an opportunity to refinance due to reduced tax rates and did a public offering. We were able to lower our rate from 4.21 percent to 2.89 percent therefore cutting off a year and paying off the bond in December 2019."

TREASURER'S REPORT

Finances Are in Good Shape

The Piqua City School District continues to operate as "good stewards of its fiscal resources," according to Chief Financial Officer and Treasurer Jeremie Hittle, who oversees the district's \$32.5 million annual budget.

"We've been financially operating in the black for the last seven years and are on target to complete our eighth consecutive year on June 30," noted Hittle, who attributes the healthy bottom line to a combined "team effort between

the administration, teachers and the community."

Cost-saving measures have included switching credit card accounts at a savings of between \$7000 and \$8000 and also purchasing natural gas through an Educational Purchasing Council (EPC) consortium adding an additional \$27,262 annually to the district's funds.

"Sometimes you need to do with what you have," he added. "You can't always get more." Hittle indicated the district has also refinanced a bond issue for Piqua Junior High School enabling the school district to reduce payments by one year at a savings of \$382,746.26 to taxpayers.
